at last i have found my vocation my vocation is love love is the heart of every vocation this book about vocation to marriage priesthood or religious life has several unique features first while being addressed to all catholics not only to theologians it does not oversimplify vocation or give a mere compilation of advice but aims to present the rich depth and wealth of the christian understanding of vocation in a simple and accessible

manner secondly this book goes right to two great saints at the heart of quite different traditions on vocation namely st thomas aquinas and st ignatius loyola and the basic difference between them a difference which is often unappreciated or is passed over superficially the goal is not to decide in favor of one over the other nor to examine in detail their historical or theological connection this book rather aims to use these different points of view to convey all that belongs to a full christian and human approach to vocation

the protestant doctrine of vocation has had a profound influence on american culture but in recent years central tenets of this doctrine have come under assault vocation discerning our callings in life explores current responses to the classic view of vocation and offers a revised statement and application of this doctrine for contemporary north american christians according to douglas schuurman many christians today find it both strange and difficult to interpret their social economic political and cultural lives as responses to god s calling to renew this biblical perspective schuurman argues christians must recover the language meaning and reality of life as vocation and his book helps do just that developed in dialogue with audiences as diverse as college students industrial workers business leaders church leaders and professional theologians and ethicists the book examines the theological and ethical dimensions of vocation as these have been understood historically and in relation to our modern social setting

throughout the spiritual journey god s love engenders within every christian active contemplative and solitary inclinations consequently each person wants to do some good to have a basic receptivity to god and at times to be alone with god as life unfolds god s love also calls forth within a person an overriding attraction toward one of those three orientations which in due course impels the individual toward a corresponding vocational lifestyle an apostolic life a contemplative life or an eremitic life in this book the authors identify the core features of those three vocational lifestyles in light of each vocational core they then discuss an ensemble of signs and patterns that point to an authentic calling from god this study offers wisdom and insight to those pondering the mystery of their personal vocations to those discerning their vocational direction and to spiritual directors formation personnel ecclesial leadership and christian educators who accompany them in their quest

what is the good work to which i am called gordon t smith acknowledges that this is not a simple question to answer in the midst of our very complicated lives that s why he has written this brief and accessible book to help us explore six core questions we need to ask in order to discover our calling in community with god and others

from a relational and evolutionary perspective on the mystery of vocation the authors develop the principles of discernment for christian marriage celibacy and singlehood they see the vocational core of marriage as a calling by god of each spouse to be a unique instrument of transformation and purification in the other s spiritual journey they identify the vocational core of celibacy as the relationship between jesus and the celibate rendering the celibate unmarriageable for the sake of christ and the gospel they view the vocational core of singlehood as witness to a certain independence for the sake of the reign of god in the light of each vocational core the authors discuss specific signs which indicate and authentic calling this book appeals to those seeking to discern their personal vocation as well as to those guiding them

much of the conversation and concern of churches and of christian individuals is centred around christian discernment or knowing god s leading in decision making the language we use around these moments is fluid and often feels inadequate ask someone how they know what god might be saying in a given situation and they may well reach for the phrase i just know in how do you know it s god lynn mcchlery draws on ethnographic research amongst those in different kinds of discernment processes along with theological spiritural and psychological insights to try and understand this phenomenum of insight or just knowing challenging the perception that such intuition needs to be marginalised and removed from discernment conversations mcchlery suggests that instead intuition can and should be intentionally matured both individually and in communities and that it can be verified articulated and recorded in forms appropriate to its own mode of insight it is a vital new contribution to the scholarship for all practical theologians researching ecclesiology vocation group dynamics in churches and communal decision making processes of any kind

what does it mean to be called how does one discern his or her calling there has been much discussion about these topics within the church and perhaps much confusion as well what if we could root the nature of the believer s calling and vocation from a missional perspective this book seeks to understand how a deeper understanding of god s mission can help believers discern the work to which they are called and equip them for missional witness in and through their work importantly rooting our understanding of vocation and calling in god s mission gives space for new emphases within the conversations related to faith and work including theologically and

contextually grounded emphases on creativity vocational freedom and vocational discernment along with innovative educational models which can support believers as they navigate their work as participants in god s mission when believers connect their gifts talents and creativity with god s work in and for the world in a way that is contextually relevant it opens up opportunities for transformative witness for both believers and for the organizations they serve

many colleges and universities have begun using the language of vocation which originates in christian theology to help undergraduates think about their futures the contributors to this volume seek to reexamine and re think this language for the contemporary multi faith context

in called by god discernment and preparation for religious life rachael marie collins provides an overview of the spiritual life both its joys and its challenges and guides women as they discern whether they are called to be religious sisters or nuns in a series of letters written by the author to a trusted friend discerning whether to enter religious life called by god explores both discernment and spirituality the key to discernment collins argues is to prepare for religious life by entering deeply into a life of prayer and sacrifice so that one experiences and begins to understand the work of a religious before entering the convent called by god draws heavily on the wisdom of great catholic women such as teresa of Ávila thérèse of lisieux zélie martin edith stein teresa of the andes elizabeth of the trinity miriam teresa demjanovich elizabeth leseur and caryll houselander among others women discerning a vocation will benefit immensely from the discussions about the difference between religious life and marriage the nature of a vocation the supernatural superiority of religious life and spiritual motherhood in called by god

in the thick of modern life we are tempted to forget what we are doing and why we are doing it we are busy socializing building careers and looking for fun but what s it all for the ancient concept of vocation has recently gained popularity as we return to questions about the meaning of life almost all religions include the idea that divine purposes should guide our lives christianity has particularly accented it the god who called israel and sent jesus has something in mind for us god s call challenges us but also opens us to the best sort of life imaginable in living vocationally the challenge and the joy of the called life is thoroughly explored part one considers the benefits of living vocationally biblical traditions of call and subsequent christian understandings part two examines why vocation pertains not only to careers but indeed touches every

dimension of our lives and encompasses our full journey through life because every person s life includes many callings some very difficult part three considers the virtues we need to live the called life well living vocationally demonstrates why to have found a calling is to have found a good way to live

bringing together narratives and theory based analyses of practice this volume illustrates collaborative curricular and co curricular approaches to promoting vocational discernment amongst students in a catholic university setting drawing on cultural religious and secular understandings of vocation engaging with vocation on campus illustrates how contemporary issues around vocation work and careers can be addressed within the catholic intellectual and spiritual tradition chapters presents a range of contributions from students faculty and staff from a single institution to highlight practical approaches to supporting students in this area and acknowledge the complementary and intersecting roles played by student support services academic staff and on campus ministry in helping students develop an individualised understanding of vocation considering the value of both curricular or non curricular activities and processes the volume highlights spiritual personal and community value in offering students explicit and tailored support this text will benefit researchers academics and educators with an interest in higher education religious education and the christian life and experience more broadly those specifically interested in career guidance theological curriculum and pedagogy and roman catholicism will also benefit from this book

the church what has it become what was it meant to be does it pave the way or get in the way are we suspicious of the institutionalization of church bureaucracy or thrilled with the relevant impact of its presence robert j suderman writes about the church as a practitioner his inspiration emerges out of the crossroads of biblical vision and human sincerity always tempered with frailty years of ministry never a stranger to complexity only serve to sharpen the vision of possibility his imagination of what can be is never divorced from the realities of what is he does not bow to the common assumption that you can t get there from here here is the only possible point of origin for us in his succinct easy to understand writing style suderman provides insightful and thought provoking perspectives to what it means to be the church to be a people called out to participate together in god s activity in the world and to create programs and structures needed for effective ministry are two sides of the same coin this book is for dreamers and bureaucrats alike indeed it assumes that the two are indispensable pieces of god s coming presence introduction by tom yoder neufeld

youth ministry has increasingly lost touch with its origins in the way of jesus and the social practices intrinsic to christian discipleship and has instead substituted layers of jesus talk middle class values fun and games and doses of warm fellow feeling awakening youth discipleship articulates the history of this domestication of youth and ministry mahan warren and white tell a story of the ways in which our society has colluded to shape a domesticated adolescence the authors believe a christian response to this challenge must be multilevel addressing the problem at three levels society church and individual the authors propose reclaiming practices of discernment that both engage congregations in social awareness and involve individuals in discerning fuller vocational opportunities than those allowed by popular cultural norms
